Our thinkAG Manager, Kalysha Hanrahan, recently attended the Advancing Women in Agriculture Conference held in Niagara Falls, ON. The event brought together women from all corners of the agricultural industry, providing a platform to share knowledge, build networks and inspire change. As part of her participation, Kalysha hosted an engaging breakfast session that fostered dialogue between industry stakeholders and students. She highlighted AITC's extensive suite of resources, programs and initiatives designed to ignite curiosity and build awareness about careers in agriculture. Using Mentimeter, Kalysha posed thought-provoking questions to participants, sparking a lively discussion on the future of agricultural education. Participants shared insights on current challenges, including the growing labour shortage, and brainstormed actionable strategies to address these issues. Ideas ranged from enhancing agricultural literacy in schools to creating mentorship programs and increasing diversity in the workforce. Kalysha's session emphasized the importance of collaboration in shaping a sustainable future for agriculture. By connecting stakeholders and students, she showcased the potential of shared efforts to inspire youth and bridge the talent gap in the industry.

## **Fun at Agribition**

AITC-SK attended the Canadian Western
Agribition (CWA), working in partnership with

the six-day event, programming included:

- Agri-Ed Program (~10,000 Elementary students plus general public) - in the CWA Family Ag Pavilion, we hosted our Grains of Saskatchewan display and the Beef Education display.
- Ag-Mazing Challenge (750+ Middle Years students) - students visited stations around the CWA grounds to explore and answer questions about our food system.
- thinkAG Career Expo (550+ High School students) - students rotated through handson stations hosted by industry professionals to learn about different sectors and careers in agriculture.
